It gives me the greatest pleasure to welcome Reach members back into the world after covid.


To witness the renewed initiative of our volunteer Branch Coordinators getting people organised to celebrate with our children at Christmas parties and Summer activities;

Local Branches

Reach works through a network of local branches run by volunteers who are drawn from our membership. Each branch coordinator organises informal get-togethers each year to enable parents and children to meet, offer mutual support and have fun with other Reach children and siblings.

The Reach Annual Family Weekend (AFW), saw some Reach families reunited, in person, for the first time since 2019. 300 families were able to simultaneously live stream from home thanks to the incredible orchestration of James Jones, JJT Services. Co-hosted by the wonderful Alastair Greener and Reach Ambassador, Ella Dickenson. Guest Speakers included: Ritchi Edwards, Frank Letch and Melissa Johns. Research team: Ruth Lester (Reach Trustee and retired Plastic Surgeon), Emma Gilpin (Paediatric Nurse and Reach Mum), and Orla Duncan (Psychosocial Nurse Practitioner) presented findings from the Early Parental Experience Study (see P5). Reach member and trombonist, Steven Haynes spoke about life, music and mental health, and Paralympian Pathway Manager, Alisdair Donaldson and Reach parent, Hannah Palin talked about advancements being made in cycling and cycling prosthetics and the determination needed to make those advancements. 




- a) Understanding the cause of the limb difference








Jo Neal




